Under Carol's leadership, the CIHA team has more than doubled its affordable rental housing, from 267 units in 2000 to over 1,300 units owned and managed in 2016. Their portfolio includes a homeless shelter, construction and sales of affordable homes for immediate homeownership and the establishment and operation of an affiliate Native CDFI, Cook Inlet Lending Center.

Norma is a single mother who works very hard to make a better life for her two daughters.

In 2010, Norma was coming out of a domestic violence relationship. During the transition, she learned to use art as a tool to help her oldest daughter heal from the trauma of this experience. She has used art to help express her own emotions and heal from the pain that she had been carrying from 14 years of abuse. Norma has been interviewed and featured in the book, "You Look a Lot Like Me," by Tortoise and Finch Productions. She shared her story of domestic violence and how she utilized art as a tool to cope and heal.

While working full-time and attending classes with the goal of becoming an Art Therapist, Norma enrolled in the CIMC Native Entrepreneur Training Program. Through this program, she created a business plan for "Healing Hearts." Her mission statement is "To provide coping and healing skills to the Native communities by utilizing art workshops." At the end of the training, she was selected by her peers as having the most unique and most helpful business in the class. Norma is currently working to obtain capital for her business and plans to launch in one to two years.

Norma is apprenticing with the art instructor at Indian Health Council and assists in facilitating the Women's Empowerment Circle. Norma is commended for using the available resources to create a future that will improve the lives of her family and community. She is always looking for ways to help the community as a whole; she is always striving to go above and beyond. Norma is an example of once you put your mind to it, anything is possible.

Martha Only A Chief

Ms. Martha Only A Chief tirelessly serves her Nation in its newly established Cultural Resources Division while attending the local tribal college full-time and caring for her family of five. Ms. Only A Chief was vital in the development of the Pawnee Nation's newest Division of Cultural Resources that now serves as her full-time employer. While employed as a 477 WEX worker in the Tribal Historic Preservation Office, she developed a Section 106 data base to collect fees on projects on Pawnee tribal lands. An initiative that helped secure funding for the creation and sustainability of this division. In the process cultural programs such as language revitalization, repatriation and Museum development had a place to preserve cultural traditions among the Pawnee people. It's establishment created a permanent position for Ms. Only A Chief, and two full-time jobs as well as two contract workers for the Nation as well. She has remained committed to obtaining a college degree even through adversity and the hectic schedule of family life. Her efforts were recently recognized by the Pawnee Nation Traveler's Club and they awarded her with their inaugural student scholarship. She has also maintained her Pawnee tribal scholarship for four semesters by carrying at least a 2.0 GPA and staying enrolled full time. Last fall she completed an Associates of Arts degree in American Indian Studies while working full time. Ms. Only A Chief serves her people by helping with ceremonies and is deeply connected to the community. Martha Only A Chief is the epitome of removing barriers in order to strive to improve her own life and those of her fellow tribal members. She is not slowing down as plans have been announced for a new language program, in the division and she has continued on in a Bachelor's degree program at Bacone College.
